International Journal of Osteopathic Medicine

The International Journal of Osteopathic Medicine's (IJOM) **Impact Factor has risen** from 0.195 to 0.579.



This is an increase of almost 300%. The Impact Factor of a journal is the number of times the average article in that journal has been cited over a given time period. All registered osteopaths and final year osteopathy students have **FREE** access to **IJOM** and a range of other relevant journals through the o-zone

NICE Guidance for Rheumatoid Arthritis



The National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) have recently published Quality Standards for Rheumatoid Arthritis (RA). Quality standards describe high-priority areas for quality improvement in specific services or areas of healthcare. One of the statements in the quality standards for RA is particularly important for osteopaths to be aware of as they are primary care practitioners:

"People with suspected persistent synovitis affecting the small joints of the hands or feet, or more than one joint, are referred to a rheumatology service within 3 working days of presentation."

Signs and symptoms of persistent synovitis

- Persistent pain (not resolving within 3 or 4 weeks)
- Swelling
- Heat
- Early morning stiffness lasting more than 30 minutes and often recurring after longer periods of rest.
- Loss of function of the affected joint.
- There may be systemic symptoms such as malaise, fever, sweats, fatique and weight loss.

Rapid referral for patients with suspected persistent synovitis is necessary to avoid delayed diagnosis and to begin treatment as early as possible. Delayed diagnosis and treatment can be potentially devastating due to the resulting joint damage and subsequent reduction in quality of life.

The key take-home message is:

If you suspect persistent synovitis, refer without delay.
